

### ONLINE TRAINING

- Do not use water on an electrical fire. Use a fire extinguisher approved for electrical fires. Know where fire suppression equipment is maintained
- Smother oil and grease fires in a kitchen area with baking soda, salt, or by putting a non-flammable lid over the
- If you cannot escape by a door or window, hang a whiteor light-colored piece of clothing out the window to let firefighters know your location
- Reduce hazards by checking electrical extension cords to ensure that they are in good condition. Avoid overloading
- check and replace old batteries

hazardous material is defined as a substance that can be otentially harmful and dangerous to people, property, and he environment. In responding to a chemical spill, airborne elatively easy cleanup to a complex process that requires xpert training, knowledge, and experience, as well as specialized equipment, Success and full containment may end upon the location, the type of hazardous material nvolved, and the amount of the substance that has been released. 
